# Scheme of Examination of M.Phil History Semester System Session 2009-10

- 1. The entire M.Phil course shall be of two semesters. The first semester will comprise of three papers and the second will have two papers and a dissertation. Each paper has 80 marks in the written examination. There will be internal assessment of 20 marks in each paper based on two assignments and one seminar. The dissertation will carry a weightage of 200 marks.
- 2. The syllabus of each paper shall be divided into four units. The question paper of each shall have eight questions and the candidate shall have to attempt any four question selecting at least one question from each unit. All the questions shall carry equal marks.
