The Centre aims at nurturing graduate attributes among students by inculcating communicative, soft and life skills to help them become better citizens of the world.




Figure 1 - P21 Framework for 21st Century Learning

Organization has defined life
skills as, "the abilities for
adaptive and positive
behaviour that enable
individuals to deal effectively
with the demands and
challenges of everyday life".

UNICEF defines life skills as "a behaviour change or behaviour development approach designed to address a balance of three areas: knowledge, attitude and skills".

- This notion of 'knowledge of many arts' what in modern times is called the 'liberal arts' (i.e., a liberal notion of the arts) must be brought back to Indian education, as it is exactly the kind of education that will be required for the 21st century.


