

MDU journey-A tale of transformation



- Maharshi Dayanand University (MDU), Rohtak was established through the Haryana Act No. 25 of 1975. The Act received the assent of the Governor of Haryana on August 21, 1975, and was first published in the Haryana Government Gazette (Extraordinary), Legislative Supplement Part I, on August 25, 1975. The primary objective of the University was to promote interdisciplinary higher education and research, with a special emphasis on Life Sciences, Environmental, and Ecological Sciences.
- The University formally came into existence on April 19, 1976, which is celebrated as its Foundation Day. At its inception, MDU started with 9 departments and 4 faculties.
- In 1977, the University was renamed as Maharshi Dayanand University, in honor of the great visionary and social reformer, Maharshi Dayanand Saraswati Ji.
- By 1978, MDU became a teaching-cum-affiliating university. It was recognized under Section 2(f) of the University Grants Commission (UGC) Act, 1956 in 1979, and under Section 12(B) in 1983.
- In 1988, MDU established a Postgraduate Regional Centre, which was later upgraded to a State University named Indira Gandhi University, Mirpur on September 7, 2013.
- The University set up a Correspondence Cell also in 1988 to provide education through distance mode. This was renamed to the Directorate of Distance Education in 2012, and later transformed into the Centre for Distance and Online Education on April 1, 2022, with the goal of offering quality education through distance and online education programs to all, especially the unreached.
- In 2000, MDU founded a prominent satellite campus known as the National Law College in Gurgaon to extend its excellence in legal and management education. Over time, it was renamed to Institute of Law and Management Studies (ILMS), Gurgaon in 2005, University Institute of Law and Management Studies (UILMS), Gurgaon in 2011, and MDU Centre for Professional & Allied Studies (MDU-CPAS), Gurugram in 2017.

- Accredited with B++ Grade (CGPA: 2.97/4) in 2010
- Reaccredited with 'A' Grade (CGPA: 3.03/4) in 2013
- Accredited with 'A+' Grade (CGPA: 3.44/4) in 2019
- Ranked 1st in All India Swachhta Ranking among Government Universities by the Ministry of Education, Government of India (2018-19)
- Recipient of the Green Institutional Mentor Award by the Ministry of Education, Government of India 2020
- Winner of the First Prize in the State Level Energy Conservation Award (2022-23) by the New & Renewable Energy Department, Haryana
- Consistently ranked among the top 100 universities in the NIRF Rankings since 2016; currently holds the 35th rank among State Public Universities in India (2024)
- ▶ Featured in Stanford University's list of Top 2% Scientists in 2022, 2023, and 2024. Three faculty members were recognized each year for their exceptional research contributions during their career. Additionally, the list included 05 faculty members along with 01 student, 11 faculty members along with 04 students and 13 faculty members along with 06 students for outstanding contribution in a single year.
- The Vivekananda Library of the University was honored with the ILA-Dr. L. M. Padhya Best University Library Award 2024 during the 70th Indian Library Association Conference held at Raichur, Karnataka from March 19-22, 2025.

Current Infrastructure & Academic Offerings:

MDU currently has 18 teaching blocks that accommodates 42 University Teaching Departments (UTDs) spread across 10 Faculties. In addition, the University has a Centre for Distance and Online Education, offering undergraduate and postgraduate programs across various disciplines through its Faculty of Distance and Online Education. MDU also has 248 affiliated colleges, a satellite campus- MDU Centre for Professional and Allied Studies (CPAS)located in Gurugram. The University offers 212 academic programs encompassing 5475 courses, with a strong focus on holistic education, community engagement, and world-class sports facilities. The University has extensive hostel facilities, accommodating approximately 5000 students in:10 Boys' Hostels, 10 Girls' Hostels, 01 International Hostel, 01 Transit Hostel, 01 Sports Hostel.





Spring in feet, MDU poised for the big leap

Q: You are the longest-serving Vice-Chancellor of the university, how do you reflect upon the initiatives and achievements of the university during your tenure?

A: I am fortunate to have got this opportunity to serve this and other universities of the state. I remain committed to giving my best for the growth and development of the institution I am asked to serve. And this is amply reflected in the growth of the institution. I am happy that with the efforts of faculty and other staff, MDU has secured 35th rank in the universities of the country, and first rank in Haryana. I have concentrated on student-centric initiatives through capacity building of both faculty as well as students. I formed consortium of Youth Skills Development Centre, Career Counseling and Placement Cell, Centre for Life Skills and Soft Skills, and University Centre for Competitive Examinations. The Consortium has logged overwhelming output. We have also set up a Faculty Development Centre for overall growth of our faculty members and it keeps buzzing with academic events throughout the year. During this tenure only the Faculty of Interdisciplinary Studies and University Institute of Public Health Sciences has been established. We have also come up with a Centre for Yogic Studies and Centre for Maharshi Dayanand and Vedic Studies as well as a Centre of Intellectual Property Rights. Our Institute of Public Health Sciences is a novel initiative which has attracted attention and applaud across the academic world. We have also come up with a Studio for E-Content Development. The list is endless but for brevity sake, I would say our national and international achievements in the fields of research, publications, sports and science speak volumes about where MDU stands today. Our Genome Sequencing Lab and Aryabhatta Central Instrumentation Lab are only one of their kind in the entire state, appreciated even by the WHO. We have an appreciable waste management system and have been adjudged the best clean-green university of the nation in Swachhta Rankings - 2018 by MHRD, Government of India.

Q2: What factors distinguish MDU from the sister universities in Haryana, and how do you plan to capitalize on them to promote academics and research? Any targets set for your last year in office?

A: The education system in Haryana is doing wonderfully well and I do not want to make any comparative analysis. But when other institutions want and attempt to adopt our best practices, it does MDU proud and eggs us on to do more and better. The infrastructure we could build, the facilities we could create for taking performances to the next level, the laboratories we could establish for research promotion, and other accomplishments tell the tale of how resources can be capitalized Our library has been adjudged as the best in the entire country. It was conferred the Best Library Award in recognition of its rich reservoir of study material and seating capacity. Its reading hall is available 24X7. We also handhold each one of our 248 affiliated educational institutions spread over eight districts. I have always endeavored to provide a conducive environment for teachers' learning. We are going to implement outreach activities that would be a compulsory credit-based course under which every single student will be required to undertake some social activity for maintaining social connect to ensure their holistic development. The green volunteer scheme for natural farming program with kitchen gardening and terrace gardening as two-credit course is also a new initiative towards women's empowerment and healthy living. My prime objective is to facilitate and ensure holistic development of students and faculty members in conjunction with the NEP. Our focus remains on research consultancy and patents.


We have also come up with a Centre for Yogic Studies and centre for Maharshi Dayanand and Vedic Studies to promote Indian knowledge system.


Q3: Have any measures been taken to bridge the gap between academia and industry and reorient the education in tune with the National Education Policy to make the students future-ready?

A: During the past more than five years we have attempted to fill the gap between theory and practice by involving industrialists and policy makers from different domains, who now constitute an essential component in our Boards of Studies and other academic platforms. Their thoughts and suggestions are incorporated in the syllabuses of academic courses so that the outcome could be 100% compatible with the latest industrial requirements. We keep updating our knowledge transfer system by keeping our faculty members abreast with the latest happenings globally. The enormity of our placement numbers, including in some of the best internationally acclaimed business houses, denote the future readiness of our students. We have already incorporated majority of the nuances of NEP in our education system, including internships for practical exposure. We would be among the firsts to fully implement the NEP.

Q: MDU boasts of vast and rich infrastructure. How it is being tapped to create more facilities and boost revenue?

A: Our energy conservation initiatives and vast solar energy generating plants have been appreciated and won us State level Energy Conservation Award from the Haryana Government in 2023. We facilitate usage of our infrastructure and facilities like auditoriums by the aspirants to boost revenue generation. We have also initiated KG to PG scheme on the campus. Our focus is riveted on extending quality educational and research services to our students and research scholars. In fact, we offer massive scholarships for research and have launched research promotion awards for academia. We are persisting with efforts to make this institution self-sustainable, and for this, we are concentrating on consultancy and more patents.





Q: What future you see for the MDU. What are the grey areas to be addressed, and how early it can be made to rub shoulders with top ten universities of India?

A: We are already in the top 35 and are working hard to inch our way up at a fast clip. Our intent is to internationalize higher education with industrial and academic collaborations. We are determined to develop skills in the youth through integration of vocational education and practical learning skill sets. We are moving from summative to formative assessment and continuous and comprehensive evaluation for wholehearted involvement of the faculty members in teaching and learning. We have already undertaken massive examination reforms which have yielded positive results. We are also moving towards commercialization of patents. Learning is being made more flexible. We are lacing it with practical skill sets to make the students job-ready at the national and international level. Scores of qualitative changes are on the anvil and while those made are visible on the campus. For instance, our Centre for Disability Studies is a very successful and one of its kind initiative. The Dafeteria has come up as a successful start-up and entrepreneurship skill incubated by our fully functional Centre for Innovation, Incubation and Entrepreneurship. It was recently invited at the Purple Fest on the Rashtrapati Bhawan lawns. We are also initiating programmes in new knowledge areas like machine learning, artificial intelligence, big data courses and capacity building to increase the capabilities of our youngsters. The entire fraternity is supportive for removal of any teething problems or bottlenecks during the launch of new initiatives with futuristic orientations.

Q:You are in the last year of your extended term. What, in your view, are the three main achievements of your extended stint as Vice-Chancellor of MDU?

A: I do not believe in counting days. I believe in making the most of every hour at my disposal to improve things and take the institution forward. We have crossed several milestones making this university a milestone on the road to academic excellence. When our peers look up to us we feel inspired to move forward. Several institutions are replicating our best practices. Our research and academic performances are being recognized far and wide and our national and international achievements in sports and culture have brought us laurels. But, no time to sit on our laurels. We are taking more initiatives to place MDU on a higher pedestal of academic excellence and research. All I can say is that with spring in feet, MDU is poised for the big leap.





Internal Quality Assurance Cell initiatives help keep things on track

The IQAC Cell proactively prepared the roadmap for implementation of NEP-2020 and Institutional Development Plan in keeping with the UGC guidelines.

Curriculum and Credit Framework for UG and PG programmes as per the UGC guidelines under the National Education Policy 2020 has been prepared and implemented in the various UG and PG programs offered by the UTDS w.e.f. 2023-24 session and affiliated colleges w.e.f. 2024-25 session with the provisions of multiple entry and exit and academic bank of credits.

Further, Curriculum and Credit Framework for Employability Enhancement Certificate Programme has been developed the implementation of which is borne out by more than 40 certificate and PG diploma programmes offered by the university.

The IQAC played an active role in offering Ph.D. programmes in various disciplines as per the UGC (Minimum Standards and Procedure for award of Ph.D.) Regulations, 2022 and the amendments made therein.

IQAC has played an active role in the establishment of a Centre for Curriculum Design and Development and Research and Development Cell as per UGC guidelines.

Further, in coordination with the Centre for Curriculum Design and Development, FDC-MMTTC, the IQAC has organised a number of workshops/sensitization programmes/seminars for faculty members of UTDS and affiliated colleges

regarding NAAC accreditation and NEP 2020 implementation. The quality initiative of the Research Promotion Policy as well the condition of mandatory publication in Scopus/web of science indexed journals by the research scholars / resource persons on extension lecture has helped the university to maintain a leading position in research among the state universities of Haryana.

Quality initiatives related to NIRF related activities resulted in the maintaining the NIRF ranking of the University within top 100 universities till NIRF-2023 and positioning of the University at 35 th among the State Public University in NIRF-2024 (MDU maintains the highest ranking in NIRF among the various State Public Universities of Haryana).

Guidelines for Appointment of Distinguished Visiting Faculty, Honorary Faculty, Visiting Professor, Scholars-In-Residence, Adjunct Faculty, Professor Emeritus, Chair Professor and Floating Faculty as well the guidelines for appointment of consultants and advisors have been formulated and effectively implemented by the university.

MD University-corporate connect for CSR funding and University Sustainability Framework guidelines have been framed to facilitate the receipt of CSR funding and attainment of SDG goals.

The IQAC has also effectively contributed to implementation of various UGC guidelines and University Activity Calendar by UTDS/branches/cells in a time-bound manner.

Spreading happiness through cartoons


