



Friends, your 'MDU Mirror' will now come every two months



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New initiatives—1 MDU launches Nasha Mukt Ghar Abhiyan





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MDU, Ruhil Future Tech sign MoU to foster start-ups

n a significant step towards empowering student innovation and entrepreneurship, MDU, Rohtak, has signed an MoU with Ruhil Future Technologies Pvt. Ltd.

The MoU aims to promote innovation, incubation, and start-up culture among students and young entrepreneurs. The agreement was signed by MDU Registrar, Dr. Krishna Kant, and Mrs. Bala Devi, representing Ruhil Future Technologies.

Maharshi Dayanand University (MDU) has taken another decisive step towards strengthening its start-up ecosystem with the inauguration of MOYOS – Ice Cream & Frozen Desserts, a gelato venture incubated at the university's Centre for Innovation, Incubation & Entrepreneurship (CIIE).

With MOYOS, now open to public, MDU has added another flavourful success story to its growing list of campus-bred enterprises—demonstrating that innovation at the university is more than an idea; it is an experience meant to be savoured.

The outlet, a see-through dome-shaped "pod shop" inside MDU's Food Park, was formally inaugurated by the Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Rajbir Singh. The Registrar, Dr. Krishan Kant, graced the occasion as guest of honour and Dr. Sharanjit Kaur, Chairperson, Rehabilitation Council of India, was a distinguished guest.

Congratulating founding chef-entrepreneur Digvijay (alumnus, IHTM 2015-20), Prof. Singh shared his "success mantra" with budding entrepreneurs: "A passionpreneur needs patience for long-term sustainability, but equal emphasis on speed, MOYOS fuses traditional Italian gelato techniques with locally sourced ingredients and ecoconscious practices, positioning itself as a "sustainable, community-first dessert hub". The rotating menu features over 15 gelato flavours (Vanilla, New York Cheese, Crunchy High), tangy sorbets, brain-freezer slushes, pastry pairings and "MOYO Slurry" shakes, with vegan and dairy-free alternatives priced between ₹50 and ₹100.

Focus on advances in **biological research**

The Department of Genetics. Maharshi Davanand University, organized a one-day national seminar on "Recent Advances in Biological Research for Human Health" at Swaraj Sadan. Sponsored by Dr. Radha Krishna Foundation Fund, MDU, the seminar was inaugurated by Prof. A.S. Mann, Dean, Academic Affairs, as the Chief Guest.



Registrar Dr. Krishna Kant attended the inaugural session as a special guest. Prof. Mann emphasized that biological research had opened new avenues for human health. and its advancements could revolutionize preventive medicine. personalized treatment, and longevity.

He noted that new technologies ike AI have accelerated progress in biological research, which is now translating into better health, longer lifespan, and improved quality of life for

the common man. Dean of Research and Development, Prof. Harish Dureja, also shared his thoughts.

Prof. S.K. Tiwari, Chairman, Genetics Department and seminar convener, welcomed the guests and highlighted the seminar's theme. Prof. Meenakshi Vashisth, Dean of the Faculty of Life Sciences, discussed the courses and opportunities offered by the faculty.

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Justice Surya Kant

ustice Surya Kant, Judge of the Supreme Court, is a distinguished alumnus of the Department of Law, Maharshi Dayanand University. He is also Executive Chairman of the National Legal Services Authority.

Justice Surya Kant was a student of the Department of Law from 1981 to 1984 and obtained a Bachelor's Degree in Law (LLB). He started his legal practice in the district court in 1984. From 1985, he started legal practice in the Punjab and Haryana High Court, Chandigarh, specializing in constitutional, service and civil matters.

He was appointed Advocate General of Haryana in July, 2000. He served as Advocate General until his elevation to the coveted position of Judge of the Punjab and Haryana High Court on January 9, 2004.

Justice Surya Kant was appointed Chief Justice of the High Court of Himachal Pradesh on October 5, 2018. He was elevated as a Judge of the Supreme Court on May 24, 2019. Notably, MDU conferred the Honorary degree of D. Litt. (Honoris Causa) upon Justice Surya Kant at the 18th convocation of the University on December 26, 2023, in recognition of his sterling contribution to the field of law and justice.
